In its 25th year, Viver Brasil Dance Company continued its mission to redefine how we honor Brazil's African legacy through dance, community engagement, arts education, and global cultural exchange.

A significant development was the global CEO search, masterfully led by Ashley Walden Davis of Unlock Creative. During this period, Natalie Marrero served as the Interim Executive Director, providing crucial leadership.


By year-end, Natalie Marrero was appointed permanent Executive Director, and Vera Passos was named Co-Artistic Director, collectively poised to carry forward Viver Brasil's legacy.

Our team also expanded:

Bryce Taylor joined as Marketing Associate, Nicolea Pettis as Productions & Programs Associate, and Donna Carter of Carter Services, Inc. assumed the role of Bookkeeper & Accounting Services, while Kai Richardson served as Temporary Executive Assistant.

#### **Arts Education Programs**

Viver Brasil's significant impact in LA County and across the U.S. is deeply rooted in our commitment to arts education and **spreading cultural awareness through K-12 and college residencies. We specialize in Afro-Brazilian dance and percussion**, crafting our own educational materials and study guides. Through dance, music, and culture **Viver Brasil teaches radical social change**, encouraging students to question prevailing power structures and foster independent thought from an early age.

In addition to in-school residencies, Viver Brasil held 3 after school offerings for young people through the **Teens in the Park** and **Juveniles for Justice** in partnership with the **LA County Department of Arts & Culture.** Additionally, we performed at **Conga Kids** annual end of year celebration at LA Live to over 10,000 students across 15 LA County school districts.

During this time, **Co-Artistic Director Vera Passos taught a class at Loyola Marymount University** where students performed in The Collegium African Diaspora Dance Scholars, "Connecting the Dots: Bahian Blocos Afros and Alabama Social History" as part of a panel alongside Founder & Co-Artistic Director, Linda Yudin. Beyond that, we taught classes at 6 different colleges in Indiana, California, Alabama, and Missouri.

Viver Brasil's educational outreach is one of the largest & most important piece of programming that we offer, seamlessly connecting with our other initiatives such as "Celebrating Samba" and "Samba in the Streets," both in Los Angeles and throughout the U.S



#### **Celebrating Samba**

Originally, Cooking Samba, our signature family program, was named Celebrating Samba in 2019. **Celebrating Samba is our signature family program performed for all ages in which we offer as a culminating performance for in-school residencies** or as a free offering to school and community partners. Thanks to our beautiful cast of dancers and musicians, students and family members get to see a reflection of themselves on stage.

Celebrating Samba is about more than a performance, but also about the spirituality of movement, as **it works to teach people of all ages about the historical and religious significance of Afro-Brazilian dance, music and culture.** At the core of Celebrating Samba is the preservation of ancestral African traditions that were brought to Brazil by enslaved peoples, and preserved as a form of rebellion and devotion to their cultural roots. Brazilian culture is filled with songs, dance and music. Brazil's African ancestors, the Yoruba, Fon and Angolan peoples, developed a belief system that held nature as their high power. They understood the necessity to respect and honor the relationship between nature and human beings and honored that important relationship by performing their stories.

This program was provided at 11 schools in Los Angeles County in partnership with both LA's Best and LA Unified School District. In partnership with LA's Best in order to offer programming while people transitioned from a pandemic social distance to an in person space, Celebrating Samba was produced in an online edition which included Bloco Afro dance workshops in both Los Angeles and Salvador, Bahia. Additionally, Viver Brasil taught classes and offered our Celebrating Samba performance across Alabama during the Samba in the Streets tour.



### Ìyá Àgbà Cici

#### In 2022, Viver Brasil hosted the illustrious storyteller Ìyá Àgbà Cici in the US for the first time since 2018.

**She is a** storyteller and vessel of knowledge about Afro-Brazilian history and culture including its dances, songs and mythic legends.

**We are** profoundly grateful for her extraordinary love and openness to VB's innovation of Afro-Brazilian culture while respecting the traditions of her African ancestry. She believes that "Africa lives in Viver Brasil."



#### **Slam Poetry**


Viver Brasil hosted **"Samba Poetry"** on December 3rd at Brasil Brasil Cultural Center in Los Angeles. This event consisted of three separate dance workshops, multiple performances, and culminated in a samba party. **Vera Passos taught Samba de Caboclo, Rachel Hernandez taught Samba Reggae, and Marina Magalhães taught Samba Fusion.** The event was a teaching experience and a fundraising event for Vera's Casa So Movimento Campaign.

### Workshops

We hosted **"Symbology of the Orixás Dance Workshop" teaching** Silvestre technique on May 29th in Seattle WA. In addition to this workshop, Co-Founder Luiz Badaró taught **"Orixá Traditions Workshop"** in Berkeley California on May 26th. Orixás are the deities or the divine forces of nature found in the spiritual practice descended from Brazil's African ancestors, the Yoruba and Gege, from Nigeria and Benin. Orixas include both the Kings and the Queens from former workshops.

In 2022 Viver Brasil also worked to create Orixá **films** with the help of **filmmaker Eliciana Nascimento** from Arizona State University. The films focused on Oxum, the golden goddess of the Orixá tales, who is proud of her beauty and the beauty of the natural world she has power over, the rivers and the waterfalls which parallel her unflinching strength.

Furthermore, in October, Candomble Scholar and Ìyá Àgbà Cici held a night of Orixá tales, movements, and stories in addition to her **learning workshops**.



#### **Dancing at The Source**

For over 20 years, Dancing at the Source has provided travelers with curated cultural tours, along with daily Afro-Brazilian culture classes taught by experienced faculty, who are among Bahia's most influential dancers, musicians, visual artists, researchers, and culture makers.

Over the years, the trip leaders have developed deep professional and personal involvements with the arts and spiritual communities of Bahia and are committed to providing travelers with a unique opportunity to experience Afro-Brazilian culture outside of the typical tourist context. Through first-hand experiences, travelers connected with and learned from many of Bahia's top performing artists, spiritual leaders, visual artists, socially conscious thinkers, and educators to advance their historical understanding of Afro-Brazilian traditional and contemporary culture.

#### In 2022 Viver Brasil returned to Salvador, Bahia for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic

caused travel bans and quarantines across the world. In collaboration with Co-Artistic-Director Vera Passos' Casa de Cultura SoMovimento, Vivier Brasil came to Bahia from August 1st – 17th.

During the trip we visited the Candomblé Terreiro São Jorge Filho da Goméia, Terreiro Ilê Axe Ojisé Olodumare or Casa do Mensageiro, the Sao Joaquim Market, Casa Do Carnaval, Quilombo Pitanga dos Palmares Samba de São Gonçalo, and Cachoeira.


#### Travelers attended lively talks by contemporary writers

Viver Brasil 2022

#### Performance

In November, Viver Brasil performed for the first time since the pandemic at the Santa Lucia Festival in Monterey, Nuevo Leon México. We are grateful for the support of Rhizome Consulting for supporting this performance. Viver Brasil ended 2022 with its 9th anniversary performing at Disney California Adventure Park's annual winter spectacle the "Disney's ¡Viva Navidad!." This joyous street party features exuberant performances, including authentic folklórico dancers, mariachis, Brazilian samba dancers, drummers and incredible 12-foot-tall mojiganga puppets of Santa and Mrs. Claus, with a special appearance by Mickey and Minnie in their fiesta best!



#### Who we Supported

#### Marina Magalhães

With the fiscal sponsorship of Viver Brasil, Marina Magalhães was able to begin performances of her project in movement, "Body as a Crossroads." In April of 2022, Diverse Works commissioned the first performance of Marina's project. Marina describes this dance performance project as seeking "to mobilize live performance to honor the body's inherent ancestral wisdom of how to be with the world. It strives to navigate away from white supremacist ideals of greed and isolationism, and towards a holistic praxis that values human, plant, and animal life." This project hopes to make new maps of the world that do not draw on colonial history, but a feeling of the earth that dancers find through ancient



wisdom, passed down through generations. **This project is a collaboration with Bianca Medina and Tatiana Zamir.** "Body as a Crossroads" held its first performance in a work-in-progress entitled "Womb." This first performance was inspired by Magalhães's experiences with pregnancy loss and presented in **2022 by DiverseWorks in Houston, TX** and in **2023 by Scripps College in Claremont, CA.** "Body as a Crossroads" is a multi-year project with many more public activations to come.




#### "Prophet"

Another project that Viver Brasil sponsored fiscally in 2022 was "<u>Prophet," a project of 7NMS,</u> <u>created by Marjani Forte-Saunders and</u> <u>Everett Saunders.</u>

According to 7NMS' Press Kit, "7NMS is the public emergence of Choreographer Marjani Forte-Saunders and Composer Everett Saunders' work as a collaborative team, **radically engaging art as a medium of elevation, healing, and futurity.** With **7 award-winning projects** in 10 years, 7NMS tote a revolutionary commitment to the Black radical imagination. PROPHET is an awardee of the 2020 MAP Fund and 2020 New Music USA Award."

"Prophet," a project which is focused on lyricism and songwriting as a form of storytelling, takes form as performance, film, exhibition, memoir, and of course, music. Prophet is, "a 4 year archival, research, & multi-genre storytelling project on the life-journey of a Lyricist. Manifesting as a Performance Work, an Ethnographic Memoir, an Experimental Film, and Album, PROPHET: The Order of Lyricism, illuminates the distinctive practices, systems, philosophies, and political ideologies that have shaped Hip-Hop's Emcee/Lyricists."


